- · Exposure to Sounds: Gradually introduce your puppy to different sounds and noises to build confidence and reduce fearfulness.
- \cdot Simple Scent Games: Hide treats under a few cups and let your puppy use their nose to find them. Start with a few cups and gradually increase the difficulty.
- \cdot Snuffle Mats: Use a snuffle mat to hide treats in the fabric. This encourages foraging behavior and keeps your puppy engaged for longer periods.

DIY Enrichment Toys

Creating your own enrichment toys can be easy and cost-effective. Here are a few ideas:

- \cdot DIY Treat Dispenser: Use an empty plastic bottle, cut holes in it, and fill it with treats. Your puppy will have to roll and manipulate the bottle to get the treats out.
- · Homemade Puzzle Box: Use a cardboard box with smaller boxes or containers inside. Hide treats in the smaller boxes and let your puppy figure out how to get to them.
- · Towel Roll: Roll up a towel with treats hidden inside. Your puppy will have to unroll the towel to find the treats. Tie the ends of the towel to make the game more complicated!
